

What is "Victim Shaming"?

"Victim shaming happens across the globe every day – survivors of rape, sexual assault and domestic violence face ridicule and judgment for stepping forward and speaking out about abuse. Sometimes, this shaming comes from more than just anonymous commenters on the internet, but also their own family and friends as well."

At one point or another, we can find ourselves asking innocent questions such as, "What was she wearing?" "Was she drinking?" or "Why would she/he wait so long to say anything?" These type of questions or comments are viewed as assumptions that the victim had a choice in this. Shaming makes it harder for any victim to come forward. Often, the victim feels that nobody will believe him/her. Also, many times the abuser is a "well -liked" individual which would make everything more difficult to explain. Shaming often comes from close friends and family members who may be ignorant about the relationship issues that may have happened. Victim shaming makes it harder for the *next* victim to come forward. Setting the boundaries for what's acceptable is the first step in stopping "victim shaming." Furthermore, we need to do our part in encouraging *survivors* to speak up and realize that what has happened to them is not their fault.

CARE Program is an extension of EOPS for single parents/heads of household receiving TANF/CalWORKs who are pursing their educational goals.

Eligibility:

- *Acceptance into the EOPS Program
- *Attend EOPS and CARE Orientations
- *Be Officially approved for TANF/CalWORKs
- *Have at least one child under the age of 14
- *Be at least 18 years of age
- *Single head of household

Benefits:

- *Academic, career and retention counseling
- *Book Voucher
- *Child Care and Transportation Referrals
- *Meal Ticket Program
- *Priority Registration
- *Laptop Loan Program
