
variety of styles, the small Cameo Theatre for class room work, but containing full stage equipment. These tours revealed that a theatre is like an iceberg—only 10 per cent is seen by the public. Backstage is where the heart of a theatre beats. And here there is a vast two-story shop for the construction of sets and scenery, major workrooms for costume design and execution, possibly the most advanced makeup room in the country, control rooms with superb lighting and sound systems, spacious dressing rooms, storage rooms for costumes and scenery, etc. The whole is one vast classroom. During "Open House" students demonstrated each and every function of various areas of the building—doing acting scenes, pantomime, making costumes and sets, etc. Dedication and Open House was a huge production in itself.

The first production in the Theatre Arts Building was Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream" in the Camino Theatre and the second was Samuel Beckett's "Waiting for Godot" in the Caminito Theatre. Both productions gave us a chance to show the new theatre facilities to advantage. Our season continues with Bertolt Brecht's "Mother Courage and Her Children," a production that used more of our new technical facilities, including motion pictures, slide and special effect projectors and stereo sound. Workshop '66 productions followed with "The American Dream" and "The President." Workshop productions are completely produced, directed, designed and technically handled by stu-

Thirty-Seventh Season of the Theatre Arts Department in Review









HE PAST season has been exhausting, rewarding, and climactic! After thirty-seven years of make-do stages, the Theatre Arts Department has a home of its own, a new Theatre Arts Building.

The season opened with Tennessee Williams' play "Camino Real," and continued with Elmer Rice's "Adding Machine" and the Workshop '65 productions of "The Old Lady Shows Her Medals," "Fumed Oak," and "The Bald Soprano," all staged in the Interim Theatre. By mid-November the new Theatre Arts building was ready for occupancy and with enthusiasm and brute strength, the faculty and students, with much assistance, moved from the various storage rooms and warehouses to the new edifice. On November 17th the building was dedicated. Mrs. Georgiana Hardy, member of the Los Angeles City Board of Education, accompanied by other Board members, officially presented the building to the college and the community. Dr. John Lombardi, former President of the college, accepted on behalf of the faculty and the students. Mr. Cecil Smith, Theatre Critic for the Los Angeles Times, addressed the audience and Mr. Jerry Blunt, Chairman of the Theatre Arts Department, introduced the distinguished actress, Jeanette Nolan, who was among the members of the first theatre arts class to be graduated from City College, also Chris Robinson, a recent graduate and star of the TV series "12 O'Clock High" who represented former students, and Mark Schell, theatre arts major, who represented the current students.

Following the Dedication "Open House" was held five evenings to show the building in action. Tours of the building included the Camino Theatre where large productions can be presented, the experimental Caminito Theatre, flexible to fit productions in a

dents; faculty participation is limited to supervision. Our season ended with that old-new smash New York hit, "You Can't Take It With You" and the charming musical "Carousel."

Extra curricular events that gave added interest to our year were the first formal use of our Green Room for a tea given by the Theatre Arts Department Staff honoring the college's new President, Dr. Glenn G. Gooder; and a new book, "The Composite Art of Acting," by Jerry Blunt, Chairman of the Theatre Arts Department, and published by The Macmillan Company.

A survey of the above activities indicates the benefits both to the students on campus and the larger community which surrounds the college. While some figures are approximate, all are close enough to demonstrate the scope of our effort. The assignment opportunities offered to students were as follows: Backstage crew 394, Onstage cast 230, and House staff 435. Approximately 140 students participated in the Fall semester and 150 in the Spring semester. The costume department fitted well over 400 costumes, altered at least half of them, and designed and made 140 new ones. The scenic department designed and constructed 32 sets, and gathered enough properties to load a freight-car.

The Theatre Arts Department offered 72 public performances and 19 special performances, which include High School Night (performances for high school students with a seminar period after), Friends of City College, and special classes. These performances had an attendance of over 12,000.

It is hard to imagine a season that could give more opportunities to our students or more pleasure to our college and community patrons.
