notes from the Author

The public has always been interested in why an author decides to write a particular work. Where does the author get the idea and how was the work accomplished? We were able to discover the following from Muriel Roy Bolton about her play, "The Golden Porcupine."

Of course the answer to the question, "How does the author get the idea?" is as varied as there are plays and authors. Very often, the playwright honestly doesn't know the answer. But about "The Golden Porcupine," I know.

I have always been interested in history, of all countries, and in reading French bistory, my attention was caught by several characters, one who was touched on only briefly, but whose life seemed too fantastic to be true. This was Duke Louis or Orleans, born at Blois in France in 1462.

I went to the libraries in search of more of him. There was very little about him in English, except for brief references to his name in books about King Louis XI of France. After Louis XI, the Spider King, there were dozens of volumes, fact and fiction, but none about Louis of Orleans, who was later King Louis XII.

I began to look for him in French books, which was slow and painful since my French is very elementary. Dictionary in hand, I read some of the historians who wrote about that period — Phillippe de Commines, Sire de Brantome, Andre Duchesne, Saint Gelais, Bayard's Memoirs slowly I read, my interest growing. So much material! Enough for a hundred books. There were big gaps in time among the historians, disagreements, and many of the years were curtained in dusty obscurity. But still young Louis of Orleans continued to beckon, tantalizing me with enough facts to belp me imagine the rest.

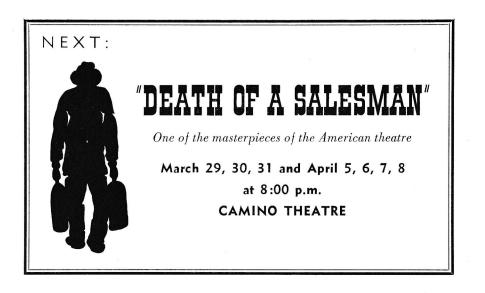
The dates were all there, finally. His birth, christening, marriages, wars. I was fortunate enough to find key speeches for almost all the characters, speeches in the bistory books which helped define characters, giving reasons for their actions. Many of these speeches, verbatim, are in the play and novel.

I wrote it first as a novel, which was published by Doubleday, and then, still interested, I adapted it to the stage. I would never have dared to imagine and write such a complicated plot. Never have dared to invent such amazing characters and incidents, their lives influencing each other, interwoven like some richly coloured Gobelin tapestry. I've embroidered a border of imagined emotions, of course, using dramatic license, but the frame work is fact. Young Duke Louis, stubbornly fighting his unequal battle, his courage only excelled by his determination, the two beautiful Annes he loved, Anne of France, and Ann of Brittiany. The three of them, in their strange triangle, will interest me always. And all the others, the lovely Duchess of Orleans, gallant Dunois and clever Georges, sad King Charles and his pitiable sister Jeanne.

Of one thing, I'm absolutely certain. Let your imagination go where it chooses, you can't think of a story more amazing than the absolute facts of their lives. They lived in exciting times, with the Spider King spinning his webs to strengthen the throne, unify France, and crush the power of his Ducal Lords, while the strong Dukes, among them Orleans, defied his dictatorship. Other Dukes died in the struggle. Louis of Orleans persevered and won.

In the timeless battle for power, and the ageless struggle for supremacy in love, a parallel of the same events could happen today.

And if it does, I will probably write a play about it!
